Dear Friends,

I know we at the Church of Christ don't formally get involved in what is called "Lent," but certainly the principles of repentance, sacrifice and forgiveness are ideas and practices we might do well to put into practice year-round, much like the holidays of Thanksgiving and Christmas. We have an opportunity to give a "sacrificial offering" to Great Lakes Christian College on Sunday, April 2, 2023. Also, on that Sunday, Dr. Frank Weller, who is President of the College, will be speaking in morning worship and then also speaking to our Men's Mentoring Group (about 11:30am) on the topic of Leadership.

I want to challenge everyone to get by with less so as to give more as God leads you. John Ortberg writes on pp. 199-200 in his book: *When The Game Is Over: It All Goes Back In The Box* about "The Station."

Robert Hastings takes us on an imaginary train ride that goes something like the following: Tucked away in the recesses of our mind is an idyllic vision. We see ourselves on a long journey that crosses mountains and plains. We are on a train, and out the window is an endless procession of cars motoring down nearby highways, children waving up at us from crossings, cows grazing on distant hillsides, fields of corn and wheat curtseying in the breeze, lakes and rivers, city skylines, and village halls.

But we don't really notice. What we keep thinking about is the final destination. We will arrive at the station to marching bands and waving flags. Once we get there, our dreams will be fulfilled. The jigsaw pieces of our lives will finally be assembled, the picture will finally be complete. In the meantime, we restlessly roam the aisles, checking our watches, ticking off the stops; always waiting, waiting, waiting for the station. Always wishing the train would go faster.

The name of the train is *more*. The name of the station is *satisfaction*.

"When we reach the station, that will be IT!" we cry.

"When I'm eighteen."

"When I buy a new 450SL Mercedes!"

"When I get the next promotion!"

"When I lose enough weight!"

"When we get married and have kids in the house."

"When the kids grow up and get out of the house."

"When I have paid off the mortgage."

"When I can afford a second house."

"When we finally retire and all the pressure is off, then I will live happily ever after."

We keep thinking that a train called *more* will get us to a station called *satisfaction*.

What if trying to pursue satisfaction by having more is like trying to run after the horizon?

Why would we ever expect more to be enough here if this is not our home?

What if the train is called *contentment*? What if the station is called *heaven*?

What if the station is real and is to be the object of our truest and deepest longings? Then we will see God face-to-face. Then our longings for glory, beauty, love and meaning will be fully realized. Then the restless human race will finally cry out, "Enough!"

And God will say, More!"

If humanity would only turn to the truth of the Bible and not listen to pop icons who speak falsehoods to a humanity without God, or heaven or hell. Look at the lyrics to John Lennon's song "Imagine."

Imagine there's no heaven
It's easy if you try
No hell below us
Above us only sky
Imagine all the people
Living for today... Aha-ah...

Imagine there's no countries
It isn't hard to do
Nothing to kill or die for
And no religion, too
Imagine all the people



Financial Stability and Why it Matters.

Since becoming President, I have focused on developing a sustainable financial model for GLCC. I've traveled thousands of miles and talked with hundreds of individuals about our mission to prepare students to be servant leaders in the church and world.

The response has been overwhelming. I am excited to announce we will finish this school year with a balanced budget! Giving to the College is 54% over what we originally budgeted. Eighty-five new members of the Log Cabin Society have committed \$108,959 in new gifts for each of the next five years, and new members continue to join!

Such generosity matters because Christian higher education matters. We all know Christian students who came home from the University at Thanksgiving break and declared, "I'm not sure I believe in God anymore." That breaks my heart. Students need a Christian college where they can ask tough questions and make their faith their own.

GLCC provides that kind of environment. The generosity of churches and individuals fuels it. Sixty percent of lead ministers in the Christian Church will retire in the next 20 years. Who will fill those pulpits? Our vocational ministry graduates. More than half of Americans no longer attend a church. Who will tell them about Jesus? Not Resuscitation — Resurrection!



In the early years of the U.S. space program, a small but powerful rocket was supported by a metal framework. This "escape tower" was bolted to the capsule in which astronauts awaited takeoff. If disaster occurred, the escape tower was to carry the capsule up and away from the main rocket. A parachute would then float the astronauts safely to earth.

Jesus' resurrection is more than a great escape. If he had merely eluded death, that would be akin to resuscitation. By God's power, Jesus didn't merely survive death but conquered it, once and for all. On Easter, Jesus returns to life not for his own sake but for the sake of all humanity. He reassures the disciples – and us – "Peace be with you."

Death Doesn't Win

In the final hours of 2021, a wildfire near Boulder, Colorado, destroyed 1,000 homes, including one belonging to Pastor Bill Stephens. His family, out of town at the time, lost all their possessions. After months of feeling buried in debris, insurance paperwork and mourning, Stephens decided that Easter 2022 would mark a fresh start.



During worship that morning, the pastor shared a photo of vibrant daffodils emerging on his charred property. Burned remnants were visible in the background, just as Easter's backdrop includes the pain and death of Good Friday. But the empty tomb in Easter's foreground means death won't win, reminded Stephens. Even when earthly life "isn't all daffodils," we have hope and eternal life through Jesus.

Easter reveals that God will "give us the joy, and it's going to be in the heart of pain that we go through as well," added the pastor. "And that just makes me draw closer to God."



The God Who Hides

Isaiah declares, "Truly, you are a God who hides himself, O God of Israel, the Savior" (45:15, ESV). But why would God hide? Isn't our knowing God the point? Martin Luther explained that God hides in unexpected places so as not to be found where the world assumes a god would be — in power, status, fame, wealth — but to be found in weakness, humility and places of suffering.

"Those who have found God in the cross of Jesus Christ," said 20th-century theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer, "know how wonderfully God hides himself in this world and how he is closest precisely when we believe him to be most distant." So God assures us of his presence in the humble manger, among the poor and outcast during his ministry, in the excruciating suffering of the cross, and with us in every struggle.

God hides not to avoid us but so we will discover him precisely where we need him most, and where others need us most.



Sharing the Load

In 1969 the Hollies released "He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother." Do you know the story behind that song title?

Fifty years earlier in Omaha, Nebraska, a boy with polio was abandoned at Father Flanagan's Home for Boys, predecessor to the Boys Town organization. Soon several older residents started carrying young Howard — with his heavy leg braces — especially up stairs. Father Flanagan once saw an older boy, Reuben, doing this and asked if it was hard work. Reuben replied, "He ain't heavy, Father. He's my brother." Years later, these words and the image of one person carrying another became the Boys Town brand.

All of us have been "carried" at some point, and we've likely "carried" someone else. The Hollies' song declares: "His welfare is my concern." Jesus said it this way: "Love your neighbor as yourself." The load isn't too heavy to bear because Jesus himself is always carrying us.





Use batik, a unique fabric-dying method, to create flags celebrating the good news of Christ's resurrection.




What you need:

- Colored chalk
- White linen fabric
- Washable gel glue
- Acrylic craft paint
- Textile medium
- Paintbrushes


What you do:

- 1. Cut fabric to the desired size and shape. Set it on a flat, protected surface. With chalk, lightly sketch an Easter design or message.
- 2. Completely cover the chalk lines with gel glue. Let dry.
- 3. Mix equal parts paint and textile medium. Paint the flag with that mixture, which makes paint permanent. Let dry.
- 4. Soak the dried fabric in warm water a few minutes. Then gently peel away the glue to reveal the unpainted areas. Lay flat to dry.
- 5. Hang the flags and celebrate!
